Landmark status

High

The facility typically known as Ricoh Coliseum, temporarily renamed for the duration of the Pan Am Games, is part of Exhibition Place, the site of the annual Canadian National Exhibition. It is a building with history, having hosted the Royal Canadian Horse Show during the annual Royal Agricultural Winter Fair since 1922. Ricoh Coliseum currently serves as the home of the Toronto

Maple Leafs' American Hockey League affiliate, the Marlies, and is where you should go if you want to see a Toronto pro hockey team win on a consistent basis.

The Exhibition grounds (Pan Am Park) is served by a number of TTC buses and streetcars

How the sport works

Gymnasts complete routines generally around 30-90 seconds long, involving feats of strength, flexibility and co-ordination on a series of apparatus. For women: vault, uneven bars, balance beam and floor exercise. For men: floor, pommel horse, rings, vault, parallel bars and horizontal bars. There is also a team competition and all-round individual competition involving all the apparatus. Each routine is given two scores: one for difficulty, element requirements and connection value and one for execution and artistry.

Nations competing

There are 24 countries competing. Brazil, Canada, Colombia, Cuba, Mexico and the U.S. have full squad of 10 athletes competing.

Tournament format

On the first day of the event, gymnasts compete in the team event on all four (women)/six (men) apparatus and qualify for the individual all-around finals and individual event finals. There is one day of individual all-around competition, followed by two days of finals for each individual apparatus.

Competition outlook

Women

American women have domin-

ated the Pan Am Games, with 139 medals all-time; Canada is next at just 44. The U.S. will not be sending its best team but theirs will still be the only one with any medallists from the 2014 World Artistic Gymnastics Championships. Venezuela's Jessica Lopez Arocha and Canada's Ellie Black are Nos. 1 and 2, respectively, in the all-round, according to the International Federation of Gymnastics (FIG) rankings.

Men

The United States and Brazil have shared the bulk of the medals on the men's side, historically, and are the only Pan Am countries to take home medals at the 2014 world championships. The U.S. team includes Paul Ruggeri, who won three medals in Guadalajara

in 2011, and Donnell Whittenburg, ranked third (all-round) in the world, according to the FIG. Canada is a distant third in the all-time Pan Am Games medal table.
