How it works

As is apparent in the sport's name, mountain bikers navigate treacherous terrain on two wheels, speeding up hills and off small cliffs as they wind around the course. All riders compete at once; whoever completes a preset number of laps fastest wins.

One lap of the Hardwood course spans just over five kilometres.

Nations competing

A field of 37 athletes - 21 men and 16 women - is anticipated. Canada automatically qualified two men and two women as the host country.

bikers only get one race to prove their mettle (and to win a medal). The women compete on the morning of July 12, and the men's race is set for the afternoon.

Why it's worth watching

Some people climb mountains. Most regard them with distant unease. Only a select few think to zigzag around them on a springy pair of wheels, pursuing global

glory and the admiration of curious fans. The next best thing to actually doing it yourself, as always, is watching.

Competition outlook

Men

The outlook is positive for Canada. Zandstra (31st) and Gagné (34th) enter with the second- and third-best international rankings among Pan Am racers, boding well for a dual medal shot. Argentina's Catriel Soto is 27th on a world list heavily dotted with Swiss, French and other European racers.

Women

Canada's chances are even better on the women's side. Catharine Pendrel, the 2007 Pan Am champion, is ranked second in

the world, and will be expected to win at Hardwood Hills. Teammate Emily Batty is eighthranked internationally, while their next-best competitor — Brazil's Raiza Goulao-Henrique — currently is 24th.
