### How the sport works

by the number 7. Think of Rugby Sevens as Rugby Lite. Same great taste but less filling of days and days of matches. The whole tournament is over in two days, which makes it perfect for multisport games like the Pan Ams and Olympics. Rugby Sevens borrows the same rules as its traditional counterpart but is played with less players (7 instead of 15) and has two shorter halves (7 minutes each). The pitch, however, is full size (100 metres by 70 metres) meaning players have a lot of room to move. For this reason, sevens tends to be high scoring and moves at a quick pace.

#### **Tournament format**

Men

Eight teams are split into two groups and play a round robin. Every team moves on to the quarter-final round, with the top team in each group facing the last place finisher in the opposing group. The second-place team from each group cross over and play the third place teams. From there it is a standard single-elimination bracket.

#### Women

A pool of six teams play a round robin with each team playing each other once. The top two teams move on to the gold medal game while the third- and fourthplace finishers battle for bronze.

### **Competition outlook**

Men.

Canada edged Argentina 26-24

in the 2011 final. In the World Rugby Sevens Series, the United States, Canada and Argentina are closely matched, with the U.S. having their best finish in sixth place while Argentina finished in eighth position, one spot ahead of Canada's ninth place.

#### Women

The Canadian women will be the favourites in this field based on their strong second place finish in this year's the World Rugby Women's Sevens Series. The United States finished in fifth in the Series and will likely be the biggest threat to Canada winning gold.
