On the grounds of Exhibition Place, where the Canadian National Exhibition visits Toronto each August, the Exhibition Centre has over one million square feet of space. The facility hosts plenty of other events during the year, including the Royal Agricultural Winter Fair in November, which fills the building with horse feces and animal psychics.

Other events at venue

Indoor volleyball, roller sports (figure skating), handball, racquetball.

Transit Options

The 509 Exhibition streetcar from Union Station on Line 1 or the 511 Bathurst streetcar from Bathurst Station on Line 2 will do the trick, taking you to the Exhibition Loop. There is an temporary express bus (193 Exhibition Rocket) from Dundas West Station (Line 2). You can also take the GO Train to the Exhibition stop on the Lakeshore West line.

How it works

The most popular sport for business types who forgo lunch for a trip to the gym, squash can be played in singles, doubles or team competitions. It takes place in an enclosed court, and players must keep the ball below the a line on all four walls that is 15.1 metres high on the front wall and slopes down as it gets to the back. Games are played up to 11, and competitors must win by two.



Competition outlook

Delierre (ranked 53rd in the world) and Cornett (33rd, a two-time medallist at the previous Pan-Am Games) lead the Canadian teams. Miguel Angel Rodriguez, ranked fourth in the world, of Colombia is the highest-ranked player on the men's side.

Amanda Sobhy of the United States is the only women's competitor ranked in the top 20.
