How it works

A mix of basketball, soccer, field hockey and swimming, water polo has two teams of seven play-

ers — six field players and a goalkeeper — in a swimming pool. Players cannot touch the wall or floor of the pool at any point. There are four eight-minute quarters. Teams have 30 seconds to put a shot on goal, unless a foul is committed.
