Landmark status

The Ontario Place West Channel is part of CIBC Pan Am Park, which is composed of the facilities at Exhibition Place (site of the annual Canadian National Exhibition; includes the homes of the American Hockey League's Toronto Marlies and Major League Soccer's Toronto FC, plus various buildings for expos, banquets, etc.). The Ontario Place West Channel is located along a man-made channel across Lake

Shore Boulevard and named for nearby Ontario Place (a multiuse site that formerly included a theme park and is now under redevelopment).

Other events at venue

Athletics, road cycling (Pan Am and Parapan Am), open water swimming, triathlon

Transit options

CIBC Pan Am Park is served by a number of buses and streetcars:

- 509 Harbourfront streetcar from Union Station (subway Line 1)

How it works

Water skiing is basically regular skiing, but on water and powered by a boat instead of downhills/gravity. And they only use one ski, so maybe it's more like snow-boarding. And the water skiing events at the Pan Am Games match up pretty well with the type of skiing and snowboarding you're used to seeing at the Olympics: slalom (skiers weave through a series of buoys), tricks

(skiers perform 12 to 18 — you guessed it — tricks, like the water version of freestyle skiing) and jump (skiers jump off a ramp in the water and glide in the air), plus an overall medal. In wakeboarding, athletes use a shorter board to perform tricks.

The slalom course consists of six buoys; the objective is to weave through as many buoys as possible, with the length of the rope changing — ramping up the difficulty — with each pass. Athletes in water skiing's trick competition and in wakeboarding are awarded points based on the flips, twists, etc. that they perform, while the winner of the jump competition is determined on distance alone.

Men and women compete in water skiing, while only men compete in wakeboarding.

Tournament format

In water skiing there are preliminary rounds for slalom, tricks and jump followed by a final for slalom, tricks, jump and overall. The wakeboard competition consists of semifinals and a final.

Why it's worth watching

Water skiing and wakeboarding

are not Olympic sports, so your chances to see them performed at an elite level are more limited than for most other Pan Am sports. You're not going to find tricks like this on any old lake in cottage country.

Competition outlook

Canada and the U.S. are expected to be the two main competitors here. As far as individuals are concerned, keep an eye on two sets of siblings: Whitney and Jason McClintock have nine Pan Am medals between them and Whitney is a five-time world champion, and Chile's Miranda brothers (Felipe and Rodrigo) are among the best in South America.
