REMARKS / OBSERVATIONS <p>Subject arrived at CBSA/Immigration on Singapore Airlines flight 018 from India via Singapore at the Vancouver International Airport on 20-Nov-2006 and claimed refugee protection. Subject was initially questioned by a Customs Officer upon a disembarkation screening and stated that he was transiting through to the U.S.A. He provided his Indian passport with a United States I-94 card with his photo attached and a United States Permanent Resident Stamp in it. Subject was escorted to Customs Primary and was processed by a P.I.L. officer. Subject was then taken to the luggage carousel to claim his luggage and then examined in Customs Secondary. During the luggage exam the Customs Officer located a document in the subject's luggage indicating that he had been deported from the United States in 2004. The subject then claimed political asylum. Subject was subsequently escorted to Immigration Secondary. During examination, subject admitted to travelling on an altered Indian passport (page 8 and page 9) and stated that he paid an agent in India \$20,000 USD in attempt to gain entry into Canada. He stated he paid \$11,000 USD from his own savings and borrowed \$9000 USD for which he is in debt.</p> <p>Indices checks showed that subject was convicted in the United States of Criminal Trespassing 1, Assault 4 and Theft 2 in the State of Washington. Subject admitted to having these criminal convictions in the U.S.A and to being deported from the U.S.A. in 2004. Subject stated that his Trespassing 1 conviction occurred when he went to an 18 years old or older bar and was banned from the establishment as he was under 18 years old. Subject stated that he returned to the bar one week later when he was 18 and was subsequently convicted with Trespassing 1; however, this offence does not equate in Canada. Subject stated that his Assault 4 conviction occurred when he was in a verbal argument with his girlfriend in a car. Subject stated he was initially charged with kidnapping and confinement and that the courts later reduced the conviction to Assault 4 when he explained the situation. Subject stated that his Theft 2 conviction occurred when he stole \$2800 USD over a seven month period when he was working for Good guys electronic store in the State of Washington.</p>					
RECOMMENDATIONS AND REASONS / RECOMMANDATIONS ET MOTIFS <p>I recommend that subject be detained for removal as unlikely to appear for the following reasons:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Subject attempted to withhold the fact that he was deported from the United States; - Subject attempted to enter Canada using an altered passport by presenting himself as a United States permanent resident; Subject paid a person in India to insert a fraudulent United States I-94 card with subject's photo attached and a fraudulent United States Permanent Resident Stamp into his passport in an attempt to illegally enter Canada and misrepresent his status in the United States. Therefore there are reasonable grounds to believe that subject and the person who altered his passport were involved in people smuggling. - Subject's immediate family stated that subject was planning to return to the United States immediately after entry into Canada; Subject's sister-in-law stated he was being picked up by his sister in Vancouver and driven back to the US; Subject's sister stated she was in

Subject was convicted of "Assault 4" in the state of Washington on 07-Jul-2000. This offence if committed in Canada would equate to section 266 of the Criminal Code of Canada and is punishable by way of indictment and liable to a term of imprisonment not exceeding five years. Subject was sentenced to 8 days jail time/suspended and 12 months supervision. Subject was also convicted of "Theft 2" in the state of Washington on 01-Jan-2000. This offence if committed in Canada would equate to section 322(1)(a) of the Criminal Code of Canada and is punishable by way of indictment and liable to a term of imprisonment not exceeding two years. Subject was sentenced to 21 days jail time and 12 months supervision.

Recommendations and Reasons continued....

Vancouver to pick him up and drive him back to the United States. Both family members stated he did not intend to remain in Canada.

- Subject has shown previous non-compliance and disregard for the law as he has an extensive criminal history in the United States;

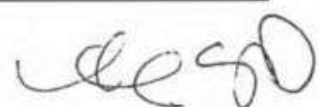
-Subject has weak ties to the community in Canada; He stated he has two relatives in Canada that he claims to have had contact with in the past. When these relatives were contacted they could not confirm that they knew the subject and denied they had met him; Subject admitted that some of the other Canadian contact names he provided were friends of his father but he had never met them and only used them so that he could provide Canadian contacts upon entry into Canada.

- Subject admitted to his criminal convictions in the United States for Assault and Theft;

- Indices checks showed subject's criminal convictions for Assault and Theft in the State of Washington, USA in 2000.

- The King County Superior Court in Washington, USA was contacted and confirmed the subject's convictions for Assault and Theft.

-The Redmond Police Department in Washington State was contacted and confirmed the arrest, charge and conviction of the subject in 2000 for Assault and Theft.
