The community associations are the first people new and existing residents see. Let them do what they do best and provide the best and most cost-effective solutions to them.
- d. Art Gallery-latest budget figure is \$84 million dollars.

## **PRIORITIES:**

As a member of City Council, I will prioritize all these projects to establish what exactly is *needed* as opposed to *wanted*. There are thousands of questions that I don't believe have been answered. What exactly did we get or *will* we get from these dollars? How exactly are we going to pay for these pricey projects? How will they generate revenue to allow for the operating expenses? Is there a better way to fund these projects? Private/Public partnerships could be explored. Cost-recovery projects are also very popular. These are all questions that I ask myself in my current position as President of the East College Park Community Association. The City's current infrastructure deficit for roads is \$147 for every man, woman and child living in Saskatoon according to The Canada West Foundation. That amount totals \$33,000,000. My policy is to prioritize and re-evaluate the above projects altogether and put the money back into fixing the roads and not allowing snow to pile up on the roads that our families and friends rely on to get to work and school.

I also want to do a review of the services Saskatoon provides to its' citizens. Are there some services that the private sector can provide? Is there a way to make some of these programs and services user-pay? I know that the private sector can provide services at a cheaper cost than the City is providing it for right now. Or, the private companies won't. In that case, is it a service that should even be offered?

In conclusion, I have many ideas that I have formed through my experience in the private sector and managing projects and people through complicated systems. These are some questions I help my neighbours, friends, colleagues and fellow citizens ask themselves before embarking on a huge undertaking. It's time the City was asked them as well.
