4. Major Changes to Constitution

Submitted by:

Victoria Confederation of Parent Advisory Councils (SD 61, Greater Victoria)

Be it resolved that

Section 9.03 be amended to read: "Such action to amend the Constitution or Bylaws shall require sixty days written notice of the proposed amendment to all members in good standing, with the exception of an action to amend more than 50% (by number of sections) of the Constitution and Bylaws which shall require 120 days written notice."

Be it further resolved that

a Section 9.04 be added to the Bylaws to read as follows: "In the event that an amendment to the Constitution and Bylaws requires 120 days written notice under Section 9.03, then members shall be provided 30 days from the date notice is given to submit special resolutions for further amendments to the proposed action. Such further amendments shall be immediately considered if the original proposed action is approved.

Rationale:

BCCPAC is currently undergoing a major renovation to its Constitution and Bylaws. The stated process for the Governance Audit does not include sufficient opportunities to debate specific sections. This resolution would ensure that anytime a major change to the Constitution and Bylaws is contemplated, the members will have sufficient opportunity to edit the final draft.

The Board believes that it is in the best interest of BCCPAC to wait for the recommendations of the audit before any substantial changes to the Constitution and Bylaws are made. Any changes made prior to the completion of this process may have unintended consequences that may require remedy through additional amendments to the Constitution and Bylaws.

The board recommends that this resolution be referred to the Governance Audit Implementation Committee to be considered during the process of revising the Constitution and Bylaws.

Rationale:

In 2005, the two year staggered term concept was introduced. The key points in the rationale were twofold: to allow new directors sufficient time to handle the steep initial learning curve and still have time to be an effective board member before facing re-election as well as providing continuity for the Board.

In our view, there is no evidence that either of the goals have been reached.

A perhaps unforeseen effect, however, is that the members no longer have the opportunity to hold individual directors accountable on an annual basis.

7. Stopping the Misrepresentation of FSA Data used by Fraser Institute

Submitted by:

Rocky Mountain DPAC (SD 6, Rocky Mountain)

Be it resolved that:

BCCPAC work with the Ministry of Education and other provincial education associations to change procedures to ensure that results from the Foundation Skills Assessments continue to be released to school districts, schools and parents yet not to the general public in order to stop outside organizations from using/manipulating the data to support their needs.

Rationale:

The past has shown us that the Fraser Institute uses the publicly released results of the Foundation Skills Assessment to "rate schools". Based on an assessment taken by grades 4 and 7 the Fraser Institute uses it to rate schools. There are no other factors included in this ranking. Socio-economics, size, diversity, sense of belonging, caring by the adults in the building, safety, etc all contribute to determining the culture and success of a school. The annual rankings, based on limited information, can at times be more harmful to a school. While the Fraser Institute insists that parents want this information, Rocky Mountain DPAC does not believe this to be the case. We believe that parents want more than a ranking based on a test taken by two grades within a school before they make a decision as to where to send their children. The information provided through FSA testing does not provide an accurate picture of the school. As well, many of the education associations do not support the use of FSA data for ranking schools.

In the Health Sector, the Minister of Health has made the decision to not release the names of hospitals in as he believes they needed to be protected from the unfair rankings of the Fraser Institute. Our DPAC believes the same holds for schools and would like to see the reporting out changed so that all schools in the province are not unfairly ranked as well.

The BCTF has been quoted numerous times that they want the FSA testing stopped because of the ranking. The other provincial education associations also do not believe that the results should be used to rank schools. So rather than stop the provincial assessment in order to stop the Fraser Institute from using the results as they do, we would rather the reporting change so they cannot miss-use that information.

Rocky Mountain DPAC believes that the Foundation Skills Assessment results have value when used as one piece of evidence in conjunction with additional classroom, school and district evidence by schools and districts to determine how students are achieving. Just as FSAs alone do not provide an accurate picture of student achievement to a school and/or district, they also do not provide an accurate picture as to how good a school is compared to others in the district or the province.

8. Ensuring successful I.E.P.'s for all designated students

BCCPAC urge the Ministry of Education to mandate specific review policies to ensure the success of all I.E.P.'s for children with designated needs, regardless of the level of need.

Rationale:

To be sure that I.E.P.'s are implemented they are reviewed during district reviews. It is the responsibility of each individual school district to provide data that they are in place and are accountable to the Ministry of Education. To be sure that these documents are not just in place but are in fact working for the child to reach their full potential. We recommend that there needs to be a point in which the I.E.P.'s are thoroughly evaluated to confirm the document is relevant, supportive, and nurturing to the child's needs.

When children reach the middle school level a much larger group of peers and educators are introduced. Children with I.E.P.'s often arrive at this level of education with a team of people from the community as well as school based. Ensuring all parties involved in helping these children learn are fully informed and able to properly support them can be overwhelming and logistically difficult. We feel this is one example where children are falling through the cracks. The intention of this resolution is to be sure that not only are we supporting children but also successfully enabling them to have the best possible learning experience as well as becoming the best life long learners they can be.

BCCPAC support the creation of a low cost yearly educational field trip transit pass to allow a class of children, with adult supervisors, to use transit for educational trips where public transit exists throughout BC. Interested parties should be encouraged to explore opportunities to finance this project with partners including, but not limited to, Ministry of Education, Boards of Education, Municipal Governments, Transit Authorities and other community partners.

Rationale:

Our communities are rich in recreational and cultural amenities such as museums, historic sites, art galleries, festivals, dramatic and music performances, recreational facilities, public libraries, community centres, and so on. A school trip is often the only introduction to these amenities children will have. These integral services and amenities are increasingly less accessible to kids because of barriers including transit costs, fewer volunteer drivers, diminishing school operating budgets and families unable to subsidize field trips.

14. Seat Belts on School Busses

Submitted by:

Kootenay Lake DPAC (SD 08, Kootenay Lake)

Be it resolved that

BCCPAC urge the Ministry of Education to immediately mandate the use of 3-point shoulder harnesses in all school buses.

Rationale:

"The laws of physics aren't suspended because a bus is large and painted yellow. When a vehicle stops abruptly, those forces are going to be absorbed by the occupants if they're not restrained or cradled." (http://www.ncsbs.org/news-2007/seat-belt-debate.htm)

Thankfully, between 1994 and 2005 only five passengers were killed in Canada on a school bus. However, 3,427 passengers were injured. (http://www.tc.gc.ca/roadsafety/tp/tp2436/rs200702/menu.htm#note2) Prior to 2004, not all provinces and territories reported a breakdown of the data element "Injury Severity of Person". British Columbia began reporting serious injuries in March of 2004.

School buses currently try to protect students through "compartmentalization" which includes:

Seats with high backs;

- Seats filled with energy-absorbing material;
- Seats placed close together to form compartments;
- Strong seat anchorages.

This type of design sometimes protects student during front collisions which make up approximately 1/3 of all reported accidents. There are, however few crash statistics on side impacts and bus roll-overs. In the case of a bus sliding sideways and colliding with another object the compartmentalizing of students is no longer an effective means of protecting students as they are thrown side to side. The installation of 3-point harnesses will prevent students being tossed around during a school bus swerving and rolling over.

The concerns about students using the 3-point harness properly, and it being the bus driver's "job" to ensure all students are buckled in, is mute as students riding school busses today have, since birth, been buckled in. It comes naturally not just to students, but to adults as well. Similarly, the concern that students would be trapped in a seat belt should the bus go underwater, catch on fire or another emergency requiring quick evacuation is also no longer valid as students today have been using seat belts their entire lives. What kind of message are we sending to students when we ask them to buckle up with family and not when they get on a school bus?

Seat belts on school buses not only protect students from being tossed around during an accident it will also improve student behaviour by keeping students in their seats and help keep driver distraction to a minimum.

The cost of this much needed piece of safety equipment is approximately \$3000-\$5000/bus. What is the cost of a court case or the permanent disability of a child? There are school bus companies that have been manufacturing seats with 3point harnesses for several years. This equipment is not new and comes in a variety of configurations accommodating two and three students to a seat. Seat belts in school buses are mandatory in New York State, California, New Jersey, Florida and Louisiana. Several other states such as Texas support local school districts' decisions to install seat belts on school buses. In all, over 200 school districts have mandated the use of seat belts on school busses in the United States.

Data based research finds that PACs are being asked, and in most cases are agreeing, to fund curricular material, supplies, equipment, programs, technology and transportation on a constant basis across all of the curriculum areas. PACs are also being requested to support funding for new ministry initiatives, and certain school start up costs. All the while parents are witnessing an erosion in student services such as gifted, special education, counseling, and career preparation. Similarly, too often PACs are being asked to fund such capital items as school PA systems, cabinets,

VOTING INFORMATION & PROXY RULES

The following applies to all Regular Members:

- 1. Each Regular Member in good standing is entitled to one vote. A Regular Member is in good standing if membership fees have been paid by December 15, 2008. To exercise that vote, a Regular Member in good standing must complete a proxy form and submit it to BCCPAC in exchange for a voting card.
- 2. Life, Honorary and Associate Members are not entitled to vote.
- 3. All proxy forms must be completed and signed by **two members of that member's PAC/DPAC executive** in order for an authorized delegate to exercise Regular Member voting rights.
- 4. In order to allow for the efficient operation of the Annual General Meeting, members may mail or fax completed proxy forms to the BCCPAC office. Proxy forms received in this manner by **no later than Friday**, **April 17**, **2009**, at 4:30 pm, will be verified and registered by staff in advance of the AGM. Voting cards, for proxies registered in this manner, may be picked up at the Credentials Desk at the AGM upon proof of identity.
- 5. Proxies not received by April 17, 2009 are required to be registered at the Credentials Desk in order to receive a voting card to participate in the AGM.
- 6. BCCPAC staff will maintain a list of registered proxies on the members' only section of BCCPAC's website, which will be updated on the Friday of each week prior to and including April 17th, 2009. It shall be the member's responsibility to refer to the website to ensure that a proxy form forwarded by mail or fax has been received and registered.
- 7. Proxy forms will also be accepted at the Credentials Desk at the Spring Conference and AGM. Please note that as proxy forms need to be validated and processed before they can be exchanged for voting cards, BCCPAC cannot guarantee that proxy forms received early on May 2, 2009 will be processed and exchanged for voting cards by the start of the AGM.
- 8. The delegate carrying your proxy should be aware of how your council wishes its vote to be cast. Members should be aware that new information frequently comes to light during the debate on a motion. Please be aware that by authorizing a delegate and/or authorizing the transfer of that proxy you are assigning your voting right to the individual who holds your proxy at the time of any vote. BCCPAC has no way of guaranteeing that the proxy holder will vote the way your council wishes. Therefore BCCPAC urges each member to send their own representative whenever possible and to choose their representative carefully.
- 9. Members who are unable to send their own PAC or DPAC delegate to the Annual General Meeting or whose voting delegate cannot be present for the entire meeting may authorize another registered voting delegate to cast their votes. As BCCPAC has neither the means nor the authority to verify that a member's voting suggestions have been followed by a proxy holder, BCCPAC encourages each member to send its own delegate whenever possible.
