Prince's Visit to Canada Does Little to Change Perceptions on the Monarchy

Charles and Camilla are still the two least liked royals, and a majority of Canadians would engage in a constitutional debate on the monarchy.

[VANCOUVER – Nov. 16, 2009] – A survey conducted by Angus Reid Public Opinion immediately after the Prince of Wales and the Duchess of Cornwall concluded their ten-day trip to Canada finds that a majority of Canadians support reopening the constitutional debate to discuss the possibility of replacing the monarch with an elected head of state.

The online survey of a representative national sample of 1,000 Canadian adults also shows little fluctuation in the preferences of Canadians when Queen Elizabeth II dies or abdicates.

Monarch vs. Elected Head of State

About one-in-four Canadians (27%) would prefer for Canada to remain a monarchy, while just over two-in-five (43%) would like to have an elected head of state. One-in-five Canadians say this issue makes no difference to them (21%) and nine per cent are undecided.

In this question, the level of support for an elected head of state grew by eight points since an Angus Reid poll conducted before the royal visit started.

Rating the Royals

As was the case last month, Queen Elizabeth II (64%) and Prince William (64%) elicit the highest proportion of favourable mentions from Canadians,

From November 12 to November 13, 2009, Angus Reid Strategies conducted an online survey among 1,000 randomly selected Canadian adults who are Angus Reid Forum panelists. The margin of error—which measures sampling variability—is +/- 3.1%, 19 times out of 20. The results have been statistically weighted according to the most current education, age, gender and region Census data to ensure a sample representative of the entire adult population of Canada. Discrepancies in or between totals are due to rounding.

followed by Prince Harry (57%) and Prince Philip (44%). More than a third of Canadians (37%) do not know who Kate Middleton, Prince William's girlfriend, is.

On this question, the two members of the Royal Family who visited Canada continue to hold significantly lower numbers. Two-in-five Canadians (43%) have a mostly unfavourable opinion of Prince Charles and almost half (49%) feel the same way about Camilla, Duchess of Cornwall.

Before the visit started, Prince Charles held a favourability rating of -15 in Canada. Now, the man who is first-in-line to succeed Elizabeth II stands at -6.

After Queen Elizabeth II

On this question, the numbers did not go through any manifest fluctuation since October. Close to two-infive Canadians (36%) believe there should be no monarch after the current one dies or abdicates. Only 22 per cent would like Prince Charles to become King, while a higher proportion (31%) would prefer to see Prince William as monarch.

Attitudes and Behaviours

Roughly two-in-five respondents (38%) say they would like to see more visits by the Royal Family to Canada, and a similar proportion (37%) would attend an event or public meeting featuring a Royal Family member. Only 28 per cent would like members of the Royal Family to stop visiting Canada.

Constitutional Debate

Two-thirds of Canadians (67%) say they would like to see a Canadian serving as Canada's head of state. As was the case in October, the sentiment for change becomes more nuanced within the context of a constitutional debate. More than half of respondents (53%) say they would support reopening Canada's constitutional debate to discuss the possibility of replacing the monarch with an elected head of state, while 29 per cent disagree.

Analysis

The royal visit, which included the commemoration of Remembrance Day in Ottawa, helped Prince Charles shed some negative views, although he is evidently not close to the favourable ratings that both the current monarch and the second-in-line to the throne command in Canada. Also, as is the case in Britain, Charles trails William in the "preferred next king" question.

The other noticeable shift is in the proportion of respondents who want to have an elected head of state (up eight points since October). The group of undecided and indifferent Canadians has become smaller, while the group of supporters of an elected head of state has become larger.
