Charest's Image Tarnished in Quebec Over Allegations of Influence Peddling

Parti Québécois opens an 18-point lead in voting intention, though overwhelming majority of Quebecers say this type of alleged corruption could take place regardless of which party was in power.

[MONTREAL – Apr. 15, 2010] – Premier Jean Charest's credibility among Quebecers is in jeopardy following the allegations made by one of his former cabinet ministers, a new *La Presse* / Angus Reid Public Opinion poll has found.

Earlier this week, former justice minister Marc Bellemare revealed that he had been asked to name certain judges based on recommendations made by a major Liberal Party of Quebec donor with links to the construction industry. The Premier has flatly rejected the allegations and threatened to sue Bellemare.

In the online survey of a representative sample of 802 adult Quebecers, 58 per cent of respondents believe Bellemare's version of the events, while 10 per cent side with the Charest government, which claims the allegations are baseless.

Though the allegations have yet to be substantiated, the damage to Charest's image and his party is clear. Nearly six-in-ten respondents (59%) believe Bellemare's claim that the premier was involved in influence peddling and 61 per cent of respondents believe that Liberal Party donors impose decisions on the government.

Even Liberal voters appear to have their doubts,

From April 13 to April 14, 2010, Angus Reid Public Opinion conducted an online survey among 802 randomly selected adults in Quebec who are Angus Reid Forum panelists. The margin of error—which measures sampling variability—is +/-3.4%, 19 times out of 20. The results have been statistically weighted according to the most current education, age, gender and region Census data to ensure a sample representative of the entire adult population of Quebec. Discrepancies in or between totals are due to rounding.



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with 39 per cent saying they believe donors impose decisions on the government, 19 per cent saying they don't believe this is the case, and 42 per cent saying they are unsure.

The premier's decision to call a public inquiry into the specific allegations regarding the nomination of judges appears to have done little to satiate the desire of Quebecers to get to the bottom of the issue. Only a quarter of respondents (25%) believe the inquiry is a sufficient step to bring all the facts to light while 75 per cent believe Charest's proposed solution falls short.

The allegations come at a difficult time for the premier, whose government is still dealing with the fallout from a controversial budget tabled last month. More than two-thirds of Quebecers (71%) say their opinion of Jean Charest has worsened in the past three months and his disapproval rating has climbed seventeen points since February (from 53% to 70%).

Altered Political Landscape

Taken together, the budget and allegations have reshaped the political landscape in Quebec. The Liberals are now a distant second, with the support of 23 per cent of decided voters—a 10-point drop since February. Meanwhile, the Parti Québécois has capitalized on the controversies moving from 34 per cent to 41 per cent. The Action Democratique de Québec (13%, +3) and Parti Vert (10%, +4) have both seen their vote share rise as well.

Damage to Political Class

While the Parti Québécois appears to be making gains in voting intention, some signs suggest that the impact of the current crisis may negatively affect the entire political class. The most cited answer when asked which of the leaders of Quebec's parties would make the best Premier was "None of the above" (34%). Moreover, four-in-five Quebecers (80%) do not believe the current allegations of corruption are unique to the Liberal Party and that the same thing could happen to any of the other parties if they were in power.

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The lawyer Marc Bellemare has claimed that in 2003 he was forced to name judges under pressure from Liberal Party of Quebec donors while serving as minister of justice in the Jean Charest government. He says that he alerted Premier Charest at the time, but that the latter did not intervene.

Marc Bellemare further claims having witnessed the exchange of important sums of cash between donors and Liberal Party of Quebec officials on two occasions. Some of these donors came from the construction industry, according to the former minister.

The government denies these claims and has said it is ready to sue Mr. Bellemare over these allegations.
